The People, The Preamble, and the Presidents



"How do my own experiences influence my point of view of a story?" "How are pictures worth a thousand words?" "What makes a good leader?"

In this fourth six-week unit of third grade, students read about the people, the Preamble (to the Constitution), and the presidents of the United States.
