My name is John Smith. I am a farmer in England. I live on the land owned by Sir Henry Williams, and I am his serf. Everyday, I work hard on my land. My wife and my two young daughters, Mary and Martha, work just as hard by my side. It is backbreaking work, and I'm starting to wonder if the protection of Sir Henry is worth all this distress.²

Our land has been attacked three times in the last two years. The walls that surround the land of our master are falling apart and can be easily **scaled**³ by attackers. What kind of protection am I working so hard for? It seems like all I do is give to Sir Henry and get nothing back.

Every month, I pay rent to Sir Henry. I also have to give him more than half of my crops and animals. This leaves my family with little to eat and even less **income.** The food we have left to sell after feeding ourselves is very little. It is only enough to pay our taxes.⁵ Our land is also not very fertile. It is difficult to grow crops in this rocky soil. But, we have no choice. We must keep on.

Leaving this place is not an option. Without this farm we would have to live like beggars and starve to death. There would be no hope for my daughters' futures. I hope that good men, with their own property, will marry Mary and Martha by the time they reach sixteen. That is the only way they will survive.
